Jefferson EDGE 2020 CRIME ABATEMENT Status Report 5: June 2012

Prepared by JEDCO and GCR Inc.





In response to concerns about quality of life in Jefferson Parish and its impact upon the community's economic competitiveness, JEDCO initiated the Jefferson Edge 2020 Quality of Life initiative. This initiative has produced eight "strategic implementation plans" which include a series of action items to address particular quality of life issues. Implementing the action items requires the total cooperation and keen interest of all involved, including JEDCO, the Jefferson Parish government, numerous other entities, and frequently State and Federal agencies. In 2008, JEDCO retained GCR & Associates, Inc. to prepare semiannual reports outlining the status of each of these action items and overall progress toward implementation.

The following table summarizes the progress made toward each of the crime prevention (CP) and anti-blight (AB) action items.

A series of articles published in May 2012 by the Times Picayune highlighted a number of major shortcomings in Louisiana's corrections system. These include the for-profit status of many prisons (thereby encouraging incarceration), the prohibitive cost of incarceration, and the fact that Louisiana's prisons often fail to rehabilitate inmates. Many prisoners quickly return to a life of crime after they are released. Governor Jindal and State Representatives Lopinto and Moreno have been aggressive advocates for being "smarter on crime." In the most recent legislative session, Governor Jindal signed a number of reform bills. These include: HB 521 by Rep. Moreno – expands re-entry courts in order to reduce recidivism and facilitate transition to productive work. HB 432 by Rep. Lopinto – repeals "risk review panels" simplify the clemency process and utilize resources more efficiently HB 518 – Merges parole and probation board HB 512 by Rep. Moreno – Allows for more rapid, effective use of administrative sanctions by parole officers HB 1026 by Rep. Lopinto – Allows well-behaved, second time prisoners to be released after serving a third, rather than half, of their sentence. HB 1068 by Rep. Lopinto – Increases discretion in sentencing and reduces mandatory, minimum sentences. However, a newly available funding source is HUD's Choice Neighborhoods Initiative (CNI). The CNI competitive grant process awards planning grants for up to \$300,000 for high poverty, "distressed" neighbor- hoods. The neighborhood that is to be the subject of the planning study must contain some form of HUD-assisted housing (e.g. public housing) that is in need of revitaliza- tion. CNI planning grants can potentially pave the way for CNI implementation grants from the federal government. New Orleans recently received over \$30 million in CNI implementation funding for the redevelopment of the Iberville Housing Project and adjoining neighborhoods. The CNI process is competitive, and it requires a cham- pion and lead agency. Thus far, identifying that champion and that agency has proven to be elusive. As a result, there has been no movement to date on submitting a CNI grant application or the pursuit of any other funding source for a community revitalization plan.
